The British Museum: "The world's first institution of its kind..."

- I. Museum's Emergency
  - A. Sir Hans Sloane: wealthy doctor (1660-1753)
    - 1. Upon death leaves person art collection to King George II
      - a) Specific instructions for it to be left from preservation and public use
  - B. Original Status
    - 1. Act of Parliament, 1753
    - 2. Opens to public Jan 5, 1759
      - a) 1758, public lottery to acquire funds
      - b) Orginionally visitors had to be accompanied by museum officiers upon entering the rooms
        - (1) Had been a debate over whether or not all social statuses should be allowed into the museum
      - c) Free entry
    - 3. Housed in Montagu House
      - a) Orginional collections (three)
        - (1) Sir Hans Sloane, Robert Harley (1st earl of Oxford), Sir Robert Cotton
        - (2) Primarily books, manuscripts, and some antiquities
      - b) Beginning visitation #s = 12000/yr
- II. 19th Century
  - A. Famous attributes during this time
    - 1. Rosetta Stone (1802)
    - 2. Townley Collection of Classical Sculpture (1805)
    - 3. Parthenon Sculptures--Elgin Marbles (1816)
    - 4. Kings Library (1823)
    - 5. Quadrilateral Building & Reading Room (1857)
  - B. Sir Augustus Wollaston Franks, appointed to museum 1851
    - 1. Responsible for much of the medieval, prehistoric, ethnographic, oriental, and archeological elements acquired during this era
  - C. Current British Museum building constructed in same location (1823-52)
    - 1. Bloomsbury district in borough of Camden
    - 2. Architect: Sir Robert Smirke
    - 3 Greek Revival
    - 4. Experiences many additions

- a) Ex: Reading Room which has been visited by historical figures like
  K. Marx, V. Wolf, P. Kropotkin, T.Carlyle
- D. Natural History Museums established 1881, South Kensington
  - 1. Collections from British Museum moved there for its formation
- E. Excavation Abroad
  - 1. Ex: Assyria (cuneiform)
- III. 20th Century
  - A. Attention towards expanding its public presence
    - 1. Guides and lecturer added to staff
    - 2. 1970s
      - a) Education and publication sectors added to museum
        - (1) Duveen Gallery (1939/62)
      - b) Oueen Elizabeth II Great Court
        - (1) New galleries and education center
  - B. British Library established 1973
    - 1. Formed as an act of parliament to combine the British Museums library with others
- IV. 21st Century
  - A. The Great Court and refurbished Reading Room open to public (2000)
  - B. 2003, 250th Anniversary of British Museum
    - 1. Kings Library restored, which now houses the permanent collection: The Age of Enlightenment
  - C. Public facilities keep growing
    - 1. Galleries
      - a) Chinese ceramics, clocks & watches, Europe AD 1050-1540, Tomb-Chapel Nebamun -- Ancient Egypt
  - D. World Conservation Exhibition Center
